Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of federal funding to compliance with federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial assistance from the OJP, the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), and the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) comply with the applicable federal civil rights laws. We at the OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with DOJ funding.

### **Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs**

Federal laws that apply to recipients of financial assistance from the DOJ prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in employment but also in the delivery of services or benefits. A federal law also prohibits recipients from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

In March of 2013, President Obama signed the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013. The statute amends the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 (VAWA) by including a nondiscrimination grant condition that prohibits discrimination based on actual or perceived race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The new nondiscrimination grant condition applies to certain programs funded after October 1, 2013. The OCR and the OVW have developed answers to some frequently asked questions about this provision to assist recipients of VAWA funds to understand their obligations. The Frequently Asked Questions are available at <http://ojp.gov/about/ocr/vawafaqs.htm>.

### **Enforcing Civil Rights Laws**

All recipients of federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, the OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, the OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal opportunity standards.

### **Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals**

In accordance with DOJ guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). See U.S. Department of Justice, Guidance to Federal Financial Assistance Recipients Regarding Title VI Prohibition Against National Origin Discrimination Affecting Limited English Proficient Persons, 67 Fed. Reg. 41,455 (2002). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website <http://www.lep.gov>.

### **Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations**

The DOJ regulation, Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations, 28 C.F.R. pt. 38, requires State Administering Agencies (SAAs) to treat faith-based organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits SAAs from making awards or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the DOJ to fund inherently (or explicitly) religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must hold them separately from the program funded by the DOJ, and recipients cannot compel beneficiaries to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the DOJ are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. SAAs and faith-based organizations should also note that the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c); the Victims of Crime Act of 1984, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 10604(e); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 5672(b); and VAWA, Pub. L. No. 113-4, sec. 3(b)(4), 127 Stat. 54, 61-62 (to be codified at 42 U.S.C. § 13925(b)(13)) contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the DOJ has concluded that it may construe the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) on a case-by-case basis to permit some faith-based organizations to receive DOJ funds while taking into account religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids recipients from considering religion in employment decisions. Please consult with the OCR if you have any questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment.

### **Using Arrest and Conviction Records in Making Employment Decisions**

The OCR issued an advisory document for recipients on the proper use of arrest and conviction records in making hiring decisions. See Advisory for Recipients of Financial Assistance from the U.S. Department of Justice on the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's Enforcement Guidance: Consideration of Arrest and Conviction Records in Employment Decisions Under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (June 2013), available at [http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/UseofConviction\\_Advisory.pdf](http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/UseofConviction_Advisory.pdf). Recipients should be mindful that the misuse of arrest or conviction records to screen either applicants for employment or employees for retention or promotion may have a disparate impact based on race or national origin, resulting in unlawful employment discrimination. In light of the Advisory, recipients should consult local counsel in reviewing their employment practices. If warranted, recipients should also incorporate an analysis of the use of arrest and conviction records in their Equal Employment Opportunity Plans (EEOs) (see below).

### **Complying with the Safe Streets Act**

An organization that is a recipient of financial assistance subject to the nondiscrimination provisions of the Safe Streets Act, must meet two obligations: (1) complying with the federal regulation pertaining to the development of an EEO (see 28 C.F.R. pt. 42, subpt. E) and (2) submitting to the OCR findings of discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.204(c), .205(c)(5)).

### **Meeting the EEOP Requirement**

If your organization has less than fifty employees or receives an award of less than \$25,000 or is a nonprofit organization, a medical institution, an educational institution, or an Indian tribe, then it is exempt from the EEOP requirement. To claim the exemption, your organization must complete and submit Section A of the Certification Form, which is available online at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/cert.pdf>.

If your organization is a government agency or private business and receives an award of \$25,000 or more, but less than \$500,000, and has fifty or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare a Utilization Report (formerly called an EEOP Short Form), but it does not have to submit the report to the OCR for review. Instead, your organization has to maintain the Utilization Report on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to the OCR. The Certification Form is available at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/cert.pdf>.

If your organization is a government agency or private business and has received an award for \$500,000 or more and has fifty or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare a Utilization Report (formerly called an EEOP Short Form) and submit it to the OCR for review within sixty days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing a Utilization Report, please consult the OCR's website at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/eeop.htm>. In addition, your organization has to complete Section C of the Certification Form and return it to the OCR. The Certification Form is available at <http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/pdfs/cert.pdf>.

### **Meeting the Requirement to Submit Findings of Discrimination**

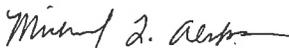
If in the three years prior to the date of the grant award, your organization has received an adverse finding of discrimination based on race, color, national origin, religion, or sex, after a due-process hearing, from a state or federal court or from a state or federal administrative agency, your organization must send a copy of the finding to the OCR.

### **Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients**

SAs must have standard assurances to notify subrecipients of their civil rights obligations, written procedures to address discrimination complaints filed against subrecipients, methods to monitor subrecipients' compliance with civil rights requirements, and a program to train subrecipients on applicable civil rights laws. In addition, SAs must submit to the OCR every three years written Methods of Administration (MOA) that summarize the policies and procedures that they have implemented to ensure the civil rights compliance of subrecipients. 1. Applicability of Part 200 Uniform Requirements

The Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements in 2 C.F.R. Part 200, as adopted and supplemented by the Department of Justice (DOJ) in 2 C.F.R. Part 2800 (together, the "Part 200 Uniform Requirements") apply to this 2016 award from the Office of Justice Programs (OJP).

The Part 200 Uniform Requirements were first adopted by DOJ on December 26, 2014. If this 2016 award supplements funds previously awarded by OJP under the same award number (e.g., funds awarded in 2014 or earlier years), the Part 200 Uniform Requirements apply with respect to all funds under that award number (regardless of the award date, and regardless of whether derived from the initial award or a supplemental award) that are obligated on or after the acceptance date of this 2016 award.

4. Requirements related to "de minimis" indirect cost rate

A recipient that is eligible under the Part 200 Uniform Requirements and other applicable law to use the "de minimis" indirect cost rate described in 2 C.F.R. 200.414(f), and that elects to use the "de minimis" indirect cost rate, must advise OJP in writing of both its eligibility and its election, and must comply with all associated requirements in the Part 200 Uniform Requirements. 5. Requirement to report potentially duplicative funding

The Byrne Criminal Justice Innovation (BCJI) will target hot spots of crime where a significant proportion of crime occurs as compared to the overall jurisdiction. BCJI furthers the Department's mission by leading efforts to enhance the capacity of local and tribal communities to effectively target and address significant crime issues through collaborative cross-sector approaches that help advance broader neighborhood development goals. Awards under this program will focus on funding efforts in two major categories: Implementation and Planning and Implementation.

None of the following activities will be conducted whether under the Office of Justice Programs federal action or a related third party action:

- (1) New construction.
- (2) Any renovation or remodeling of a property located in an environmentally or historically sensitive area, including property (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain, a wetland, or habitat for an endangered species.
- (3) A renovation that will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size.
- (4) Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment.

Additionally, Rockdale is ranked 32nd of 309 cities in Georgia for highest crime rate.

The Fieldstone & Country Walk neighborhoods are located in zip code 30013 approximately 5 miles north and 5 miles south of GA Interstate 20 and comprised of about 20 blocks with 273 units, does not receive any federal, state and/or local funds.

The Rockdale County Board of Commissioners, Rockdale County Sheriff's Office and Revitalization of Communities determined that there was a need to engage in the assessment and review of community- oriented strategies to address targeted crime issues within the Fieldstone & Country Walk communities of Rockdale County. For example, since 2011, robberies in these communities have increased 63% and we are on target to increase by 50% over last year. 87% of these robberies are perpetrated with firearms.

Crime analysis and mapping demonstrates hot spots in the neighborhood are evident when compared to countywide and all law enforcement zones. The hot spot contains approximately 33 percent of the homicides, 22 percent of the robberies, 20 percent of the burglaries, 22 percent of the entering autos, and 21 percent of the entering autos for the Rockdale County. Data from 2013 identified 706 juvenile calls for the entire county, but 179 or 26% came from the target neighborhood. Subsequent years demonstrate 28% for 2014 and 26% for 2015. Data from surveys confirmed the trend regarding juvenile criminal activity. When asked 'who do think is committing the crime', only eight percent of the residents believed adults were committing crimes, 43 percent were not sure if was adults or juveniles were culpable and 46 percent believed it was solely juveniles.

Additional census block data demonstrates the neighborhood's ranking in comparison to the other 46 census blocks within Rockdale County. The data offers a concern for population density with 3,385 residents compared to the average of 1,852 residents considering there are not any apartment/multi-family units beyond duplexes. The target area ranks first in the percent of renters, percent African American, persons aged 15-24, double the average for single families with children under 18, and next to last in categories for percent of males and males over 40 years old in the neighborhood. The most significant census data was the number one ranking for violent crime per 1000,000 that is approximately 500 percent more than the average block.

Qualitative data observes a high level of apathy that begins with law enforcement where community members rarely call police for help or to complain. Survey results indicate 77 percent of adults keep to themselves while it is perceived that 45 percent of the adults don't about care the neighborhood and 57 percent of the adults don't take an interest in the juvenile activity and possess a willingness to assist juveniles. Additional trending concerns include the level of trash on the streets and overflowing trashcans, the overgrown and un-kept entrances, lack of area and activities for youth. Lastly noted was the confusion or lack of knowledge of services available to the community. This lack of response is verified the minimal calls to Code Enforcement also confirm the level of apathy.

The strategies include ensuring the cross sector partnership remains engaged and committed to the revitalization of the neighborhood. The project will hire a Community Compliance Supervisor that will facilitate and manage the project's collaboration among all key stakeholders including quarterly meetings with community residents.

The project will address crime and community safety by placing Community Oriented Polices Officers in the community to maintain a continuous presence and work with community resident in a proactive manner to reduce the levels of apathy experience by the residents. However, the officers will implement Problem Oriented Policing strategies that are focused on specific criminal behaviors including gang related activity, robbery, domestic violence, assaults and homicides. A focus will also be placed on juvenile criminal activities in an attempt to create a culture of accountability and opportunity for change.

The revitalization will continue with the opening of a community center that will serve a focal point for the residents to take advantage of services provided by the Community Compliance Supervisor, Sheriff's Office, as well as other services such as Code Enforcement, Health Department, Department of Labor, Probation and Parole, and etc. The Center will provide educational programing for juveniles and adults that range from tutorial services to soft skills to add while seeking employment. Additional activities will include providing outdoor activities and creations of sports league that utilize law enforcement and parents to participate in a positive manner.

To continue enhancing the collective efficacy of the community, strategies focused on increasing Code Enforcement engagement with the community, educating residents and landlords to ensure a co-active approached is emphasized, providing large trash dumpsters to offer proper facilities to eliminate trash, and work with the County Attorney and Board of Commissioners to develop stringent code pertaining to housing that does not meet code and/or requires destruction.
